The Counselors Corner webinar scheduled for July 19 is titled *Building Sustainability through First Touch*. Based on the title alone the answer is no, but the brief description makes it sound possible this webinar may provide information that can improve your skills as a homebuyer educator. HUD-sponsored research study on the benefits of housing education. Early findings from a rigorous study of the benefits of education and counseling for first-time homebuyers indicate families are more likely to participate when offered online services than when offered inperson workshops. Sixty-five percent of those offered remote homebuyer education initiated those services, while only 25% of those offered in-person education and counseling chose to participate. The study will follow 5,800 enrollees over four years and includes three study groups: remote, in-person, and a control group that was not offered education and counseling services. Preliminary impacts of education and counseling include improved performance on a four-question mortgage literacy quiz, higher likelihood group members will contact lenders in times of crisis, but no difference in the likelihood that they will compare budget and actual spending. The fourth impact cited in the study indicated those receiving education were more likely than the control group to have a credit score of 620 or higher. The report did not indicate how researchers determined a causal relationship between participation and higher scores.
